PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES IN MALAYSIA



World Report on Disability 2011 by World Health Organization (WHO) and the World Bank estimates that about 15% of total population of a country comprises persons with disabilities.

However, voluntary registration of persons with disabilities in Malaysia as of April 2014 stands at only 506,228 persons.



PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES IN MALAYSIA



Current population = 29.7 million

15% estimation = 4.4 million

PWDs registered (as of April 2014) = 506,228 (1.7%)

Difference = 3.9 million (13.3%)

REGISTRATION OF PWDs (Part III, Sections 20 – 25, PWDs Act 2008)

- The 7 categories of disabilities:
 - i) visual impairment;
 - ii) hearing impairment;
 - iii) speech impairment;
 - iv) physical disabilities
 - v) learning disabilities;
 - vi) mental disorder; andvii) multiple disabilities.



 The Government of Malaysia firmly believes that PWDs are entitled to have the same rights as all other citizens in the country and equal opportunities to partake in the country's development.

REGISTRATION OF PWDs

 Registration of PWDs is important to enable the government to recognise and identify the disabilities in order to plan and formulate appropriate programmes for the development of PWDs.





ONLINE REGISTRATION SYSTEM (SMOKU)







To facilitate and expedite the registration of persons with disabilities, the Department of Social Welfare has developed the Information Management System for Disabled or also known as "SMOKU".

New Kad OKU is issued and equipped with security features and groove for easy identification by the blind.

This system has won FutureGov Awards Malaysia 2013 - presented during the 11th annual FutureGov Forum Malaysia 2013 Conference.






- The government's commitment in ensuring that the PWDs in the country are given their due rights is reiterated through:
 - adoption of the Asian & Pacific Decade of Disabled Persons (1st decade: 1993 – 2002 & 2nd decade: 2003 – 2012);
 - signing of the Proclamation on the Full Participation and Equality of People with Disabilities in the Asia and Pacific Region on 16 May 1994.

INTERNATIONAL COMMITMENTS

 endorsement of the Biwako Millennium Framework for Action (BMF) Towards an Inclusive, Barrier-Free and Rights Based Society for People with Disabilities (2002) and Biwako Plus Five (2007);



Signing of the Convention on the Rights of the Child (CRC) in 1995 and is therefore fully committed to enforce Article 23 of the said Convention regarding the rights of children with disabilities.


CONVENTION ON THE RIGHTS OF PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

- Malaysia signed the Convention on 8 April 2008 and ratified it on 19 July 2010.
- As a State Party, Malaysia is bound to undertake its commitments and obligations under the Convention and also obligated to introduce measures that promote the human rights of PWDs without discrimination.





INCHEON STRATEGY



In November 2012, Malaysia together with other member states of UN ESCAP has adopted the Ministerial Declaration on:

- the Asian & Pacific Decade of Disabled Persons, 2013 – 2022; and
 - the Incheon Strategy to Make the Rights Real for Persons with Disabilities in Asia and Pacific.

NATIONAL

PWDs' POLICY



In November 2007, Malaysia formulated the **PWDs Policy and National Plan of Action.**

- This Policy recognises that PWDs are free from any physical, social, economic, cultural as well as attitudinal barriers.
- It will be used as a foundation to ensure PWDs enjoy their full and effective participation in the society on an equal basis with others.
- 15 strategies underlined in the Policy (including advocacy, accessibility, education, health, employment, social support, etc.)

PWDs ACT 2008

- In December 2007, the PWDs Act 2008 was passed by the Parliament and came into force on 7 July 2008.
 - It is an Act that provides for the registration, protection, rehabilitation, development and well being of PWDs, the establishment of the National Council for PWDs, and for matters connected therewith.
 - The Act is aimed to ensure that the rights, interests and welfare of PWDs in the country are protected.
 - Drafted after taking into consideration all provisions provided under the United Nations Convention on the Rights of PWDs.

NATIONAL COUNCIL FOR PWDS

- The National Council for PWDs was established on 14 August 2008 and chaired by the Minister of Women, Family and Community Development.
- Among the Council's functions (Section 9, the PWDs Act 2008) are:
 - to monitor the implementation of the national policy and national plan of action relating to PWDs;
 - to make recommendations to the Government on all aspects of PWDs (eg. support, care, protection, rehabilitation, development and well-being of PWDs).

Responsible to assist the Council in the performance of its functions and the exercise of its power under the PWDs' Act 2008




OTHER INITIATIVES/ PROGRAMMES TOWARDS PWDS' RIGHTS

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HEALTH (Section 35, PWDs ACT 2008)

The Government is committed to provide an accessible and affordable health services to all including persons with disabilities.



Objectives: to provide equal opportunities for health care for persons with disabilities

to empower individuals, families and communities for self care and development of support services for persons with disabilities

- Advocate on issues and policies on persons with disabilities;
- Increase on accessibility to facilities and services;




Ministry of Health (MOH) carries out growth and developmental assessment for early detection of disabilities among children aged from 0-6 years.

This early detection is carried out at 3,072 facilities which include health clinics, community clinics and mobile health team.





EMPLOYMENT (Section 29, PWDs Act 2008)

To encourage and increase the participation of persons with disabilities in employment:



aimed to assist qualified persons with disabilities to be hired and hold suitable positions in the public sector



Job Coach Services

provides assistance to both persons with disabilities and employer, helps persons with disabilities to get suitable jobs according to their eligibility, ability, skills and knowledge and to help them sustain their jobs at the workplace Job Matching and Placement System for Persons with Disabilities (SPOKU)

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allows job matching of the right candidates with the right job


SELF EMPLOYMENT

- One of the ways for PWDs to attain economic independence / self sufficiency.
- Offers PWDs the freedom to work at their own pace in an environment that accommodates their special needs.
 - Provides the flexibility that is necessary to those who require frequent medical attention, flexible hours, accessible work space, or other special considerations.



PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION (Section 27, PWDs Act 2008)



- Access to transportation for persons with disabilities is one of the fundamentals towards inclusive development.
- Ministry of Transport, who leads the Transportation Committee under the National Council for Persons with Disabilities, continuously pursues its effort to promote accessible public transportation in Malaysia.

COMMUNITY-BASED REHABILITATION CENTRES

REHAB & RESIDENTIAL CARE SERVICES



1. COMMUNITY BASED-REHABILITATION (CBR)

- CBR was introduced in 1984 as a strategy within the community for the rehabilitation, equalisation of opportunities and social integration of all PWDs, including children.
- CBR is implemented through the combined efforts of persons and children with disabilities themselves, their families and communities, together with the appropriate health, education, vocational and social services.
- It aims to reduce the impact of disability and provides the support services for families of persons and children with disabilities.

CBR CENTRES AS ONE-STOP CENTRES

- Among services provided at the CBR centres:
 - Early detection and intervention programmes;
 - Registration of PWDs;
 - Rehabilitation;
 - Resource and referral centre; and
 - Advocacy.





ACTIVITIES AT CBR CENTRES

- Therapies;
- Language and Development;
- Basic Daily Life Skills;
- Reading, Writing and Arithmetic (3R);
- Recreational Therapy;
- Vocational training to prepare the PWDs for employment; and
- Independent Living (IL) Training.

(a) Care Centre for the Disabled (Taman Sinar Harapan - TSH)

Provide care & rehabilitation services for persons with learning disabilities.

- Taman Sinar Harapan Jubli, Johor Bahru (Female);
- Taman Sinar Harapan Tunku Ampuan Najihah, Seremban;
- Taman Sinar Harapan Kuala Kubu Bharu, Selangor;
- Taman Sinar Harapan Bukit Besar, Kuala Terengganu;
- Taman Sinar Harapan Cheras, Selangor; and
- Taman Sinar Harapan Jitra, Kedah.

Objective: to empower and equip the physically disabled persons with necessary skills to their optimum capacity in order to prepare them for the work force









SOCIAL PROTECTION

The Government is moving towards **PRODUCTIVE WELFARE APPROACH**

Productive group: provide with skills training and income generating opportunities:

- funding, management, training and marketing programmes;
- provide welfare assistance & support; and
- develop self-reliance

Non-productive group: provide with welfare assistances or financial aids, shelter, health care and subsidised services under certain criteria and eligibilities

WELFARE FINANCIAL ASSISTANCES FOR PERSONS WITH DISABILITIES

Types of welfare assistance provided by the DSW for PWDs are:

- Aid for Assistive Devices (actual cost);
- Disabled Worker Allowance of RM300 per month for those who earn below RM1,200 per month;
- Launching Grant of maximum RM2,700 one-off;
- Special aid to the caregivers of the disabled and chronically ill who are bedridden of RM300 per month; and
- Special aid to the disabled who are unable to work of RM150 per month.

CHALLENGES

-

CHALLENGES

- Lack of awareness on the rights and needs of persons with disabilities among policy makers, service providers and general public.
- Lack of a comprehensive and integrated data collection on disabilities.
- Lack of understanding on the requirement of the laws, regulations and guidelines by implementers pertaining to the needs of persons with disabilities (eg: to provide PWDs' friendly facilities).
 - Lack of effective implementation by service providers and enforcement by the authority bodies.

CHALLENGES

- Negative perception of the public at large pertaining to the ability of persons with disability to work.
- Shortage of qualified teachers and the lack of uniformed access to education
- Lack or limited availability of respite care services to PWDs.

PHASE I (2013 – 2015): IDENTIFYING GAPS AND STRENGTHENING EXISTING FOUNDATIONS

- Establish integrated database of persons with disabilities in Malaysia;
- Reviewing legislations, policies and plan of action pertaining to persons with disabilities (e.g: PWDs Act, national policy on PWDs and 1% policy for PWDs in public sector);
- Improve accessibility of persons with disabilities to the built environment, public transportation, education, health care services, employment, etc;

PHASE I (2013 – 2015):

IDENTIFYING GAPS AND STRENGTHENING EXISTING FOUNDATIONS

- Increase public awareness and understanding on the rights of persons with disabilities (to remove the attitudinal barriers);
- Build the capacity of persons with disabilities to realise their full potential;
- Strengthening public-private partnership as well as with NGOs; and
- Strengthen and support research and development on disabilities.

PHASE II (2016 – 2022):

- Evaluation on the implementation of the existing policies and laws related to persons with disabilities.
- Upscaling the initiatives towards improving the quality of life of persons with disabilities
 explore provision of new initiatives like respite
 - care and strengthening independent living programmes.

 Enforcement through legislations on the rights of persons with disabilities.

WAY FORWARD (2023 AND BEYOND)

<u> AIMS:</u>

- Persons with disabilities enjoy equal rights and opportunities in all aspects of life to ensure their full and effective participation in the society and development;
- Persons with disabilities enjoy equal recognition before the law and access to justice on an equal basis with others;
- All forms of discrimination on the basis of disability is eliminated;
 - Public awareness and understanding on the rights of persons with disabilities is increased.

JOB COACH SERVICES

SUPPORTED EMPLOYMENT

JOB COACH

Provide competitive work for individuals with disabilities in integrated settings with on-going training and support provided on job site as needed to perform that work.



• Functions of Job Coach:

To train and give support to PWDs employees to help them learn and perform job tasks as well as necessary interpersonal skills to be accepted as workers and to enable them sustain in their employment.

Help employers and other employees on the understanding of disabilities and the needs of disabled employees. Job Coach Services was formally launched by the Social Welfare Department in 2012

FACTS ON JOB COACH

- October 2010 December 2013 = 1,099 job coaches were trained to assist persons with disabilities to work
 - social welfare officers
 CBR workers
 special education teachers
 hospitals' personnel and
 private companies' personnel
- Currently, 108 persons with disabilities are employed through job coach services
- Another 722 persons with disabilities are hired by 22 private companies after their personnel attended job coach seminars and courses.








LAUNCHING GRANT

- Provided by the Department of Social Welfare
- Amount: RM2,700 (maximum)
- To encourage persons with disabilities to venture into small businesses





RECIPIENTS OF LAUNCHING GRANT (AS OF DECEMBER 2013) - OVERALL



RECIPIENTS OF LAUNCHING GRANT (AS OF DECEMBER 2013) – OKU




ALLOCATION OF LAUNCHING GRANT (AS OF DECEMBER 2013) - ALLOCATIONS

SBGP-OKU:

- introduced by the Ministry of Human Resources
- disabled entrepreneurs are provided with funds amounting to a maximum of RM100,000
- Aim: to assist disabled entrepreneurs to help disabled persons to obtain employment and on the same time enable them to expand their business.





SBGP-OKU:

• Since its implementation in 2007 until August 2014:

- 856 persons with disabilities have received the assistance
- has successfully created job opportunities for 1,750 persons with disabilities.
- The nature of business run by the disabled entrepreneurs include sewing, reflexology, provision shop, agriculture, food, manufacturing, textile, work shop and livestock farm.
- Through this scheme disabled entrepreneurs were able to increase their income and sustain their businesses.

SHELTERED EMPLOYMENT

- Provided in Sheltered Workshops established under the Social Welfare Department or NGOs.
- Meant for PWDs who are unable to compete in open job market yet their socio economy level need to be improved without infringing on their welfare and rights.
- Employment opportunities available:
 - Specific services (long term projects) tailoring, printing & handicraft, chocolate, laundry services.
 - General services (ad-hoc projects undertake subcontracting works from factories in surrounding areas) - assembly work for plastic, rubber, and alloybased products.

CHOCOLATE WORKSHOP

- Located in Sheltered Workshop Sg Petani Kedah.
- Registered with the Registrar of Companies.
- 7 PWDs workers (with SOCSO and EPF contribution).
- Income: RM85/month per PWD worker.
- Currently expand the market of the product to Penang, Perak and Kuala Lumpur.




